Persons with Disabilities; Sexuality and SRHR Definition of Disability:

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD), defines Persons with Disabilities as "those who have long-term physical, mental, intellectual or sensory impairments, which in interaction with various barriers, may hinder their full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others". The Act Relating to the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, 2017 has also defined persons with disabilities on similar lines to that of Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disability (CRPD).

Background

Although an estimated 15 % of the world's population live with a disability, many of the persons with disabilities (PWD) are marginalized and their human rights are violated. Furthermore, their sexual and reproductive health (SRH) needs or their sexual rights are not fully recognized and acknowledged: they have often been denied their right to establish relationships or to decide whether to have a family, and many have faced forced sterilizations, abortions or marriages. PWD face discrimination and barriers to information and services, and encounter stigma and stereotypes especially when it comes to their sexuality. Negative attitudes, ignorance and misconceptions of the societies, health-care service providers and even family members raise most of these barriers. Furthermore, PWD are more likely to experience gender-based violence, sexual abuse, and emotional abuse, and are more likely to be infected with HIV or other sexually transmitted infections (STI). Many issues regarding SRHR of PWD are equally burdening men and women, but there are many genders specific issues. Taken into consideration that currently low access to SRHR in developing countries and consequent poor SRH outcomes represent one-third of the total global burden of disease for women aged 15-44 years, it is alarming that SRHR of PWD is globally neglected and underfinanced field.

Overall goal of the project

Improve Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) of People with Disability (PWD).

Service Delivery: (Period 2019 and 2021)

Outreach clinical session were organized in PwD community in close coordination with District Health Office and Organization of People with Disability (OPD). PwD client's interest in the service is ever increasing trend, as evidenced by the service statistics. Service has been extended in this community since the project started. Despite some problems due to C-19 pandemic since last two years, PwD clients are providing SRH services using protocol by service providers. In 2019, total number of SRH service was 7,902, while in 2020 number decreased slightly to 7,635 due to COVID-19. In 2021, service increased again to 9,879 as figure given below. Accordingly, services data confirms that FP service is also in increasing trend. Still there is one year left of the project. If the situation becomes favorable, about 90 percent of the total target can be achieved. In other hand sensitization program to PWD parents on SRHR of PwD is totally community-based program and purpose of this program is to change stereotypes and misconceptions and decrease the stigma around SRHR of PwD in the community which conducting by trained PwD peer educators. Awareness raising program also been implementing by Peer Educators and purpose of program was to generate demand of SRH services among PwD including basic information about SRHR and available SRH services for PwD.

One of remarkable result is that FPAN started to keep records from January 2021 of Persons with disabilities by its' all branches in District Information System (DHIS) by type and gender with an identifiable symbol and incorporated age segregated data from June 2021. It's a big achievement of the project and it will definitely prove to be a milestone in the sustainable development of project program. As result total number of PwD clients 1,118 were benefited in this reporting period among the above number contribution of project district Bhaktapur, Kathmandu and Lalitpur was 626 (44%).

Success story in COVID-19

Sanjiya Shrestha, working as a Peer Educator at FPAN Valley Branch representing from PwD community. COVID-19 pandemic has brought a lot of crises in every possible sectors. Among others health is the most effected and hardest hit area globally. In these situations, marginalized groups including Persons with disabilities (PwDs) have very difficult time even to get their basic and personal requirements fulfilled. The nature of the infection additionally worsens the minimal possibility of getting help even from nearest person.

During lockdown PwDs couldn't even get menstruation sanitary products and access to information's as well as services due to functional limitations. To mitigate this problem we distributed sanitary pads, mask, hand wash/sanitizers, contraceptives and so on to persons with disabilities. Also distributed Sanitary pad, urine bag, folly catheter, Dippers to disable people especially to those suffering from spinal injuries through DPOs under MFA Vaestoliitto support.

We had conducted several virtual awareness sessions where divers disabled participants were informed about rumors of the virus and were taught ways of prevention. Several awareness raising virtual events on menstruation hygiene, pregnancy, delivery and infant care were also conducted by keeping COVID-19 into focus. Sign language translation for hearing impaired persons, descriptive methods for visually impaired persons and other measures were specially used in every session to address needs of particular disability type and also reduce barriers placed by the virtual medium. Beside this, counseling was also provided to address person-based queries. Similarly, social medias such as messenger, what's app, Viber and Facebook groups were also used to reach out and spread awareness to as many persons as possible.

Due to these attempts PwDs were able to get the right SRH information with the accessible mediums and also services to their doors during health emergencies. The situation was very challenging for us. However, we faced challenges in looking alternatives and were able to provide services to some extent. When we reached our PwD community by using safety major, we were always inspired to see the happiness on their faces. It was really a great experience for me and all of collogue.
